CHAIR'S REPORT

If you look across Montsalvat's beautiful slopes towards the setting western sun, you can well understand why its twentieth-century founders, with their roots in Northern European myth, named it after the place of the holy grail, a site of aspiration. Art is always looking beyond itself, striving for perfection, for the ineffable. But they might also have invoked the Roman god, Janus, who ruled over beginnings, transitions, doorways and time, Janus with his uncanny ability to see in two directions at once.

Montsalvat must always have an eye to its history – its art, architecture and the women and men who made both – but it must also honour their vision by obeying the great imperative of art – to be authentic in its own time, and to cherish the past without being constrained by it, to build on an inheritance but with an imaginative eye to the future.

THE BOARD

The Montsalvat Ltd Board is Trustee of a founding vision for creation and education in the arts. It is also the custodian of an establishment that has to be maintained, kept financially viable, secure, nourished and prosperous – in all ways. That is the task of Montsalvat Ltd's independent Board, formed in 2006, and populated by directors with a broad range of skills and experience in art, arts education, music, architecture, law, literature, finance, engineering, philanthropy, public relations, governance, business, administration and marketing (details of the Board are on page 21).

In November 2017, the Board mourned the passing of one of its original Directors, Max Jörgensen, son of Montsalvat's patriarch, Justus Jörgensen. In April 2018, Rob Hauser completed his nine-year tenure as CEO and Executive Director, during which time he played a large role in putting Montsalvat into the sound financial and governance position it enjoys today. An immediate search was begun for a new Executive Director, and in the interim, Board Directors Peter Moore and Michael Liffman acted as Montsalvat's Executive Committee, assisting, and being assisted by, General Manager and Director, Anthony Aspridis. (The new Executive Director selection process was completed in September 2018, with the appointment of Dr Jacqueline Ogeil). Succession planning for vacancies on the Board is currently underway, taking into account Montsalvat's constitutionally ordained criteria for selection.

Montsalvat Ltd is a not-for-profit company, and its Board Directors volunteer their services. Former Directors, Phillip Adams AO and Dr Barry Jones AC became Patrons of Montsalvat at the conclusion of their respective terms.

BOARD MEETINGS

In 2017-2018 Montsalvat held its customary five Board meetings, including an Annual General Meeting. The Montsalvat Foundation Incorporated also held its AGM and Committee meetings. The Foundation is Montsalvat's charitable arm, through which donations can be channeled in accordance with Montsalvat's status as a gift deductible charitable organisation.

Some Montsalvat Board, Committee and Foundation business is conducted electronically between meetings, as occasion requires.

COMMITTEES

The work of the Montsalvat Board is supplemented by the activities of its various Committees, which meet regularly throughout the year and operate within strict terms of reference. The Committees, drawing on the diverse talents and experience of Board Directors, enable close supervision of governance, financial, promotional and developmental matters.

Currently there are three committees:

- Finance, Audit and Risk Management Committee, chaired by Dr Catherine Dale.
- Governance Committee chaired by John Howie, AM
- Network and Fundraising Committee, chaired by Peter Moore.



GOVERNANCE

Montsalvat Ltd is committed to a continuous program of revision and updating of its foundational documents to keep them abreast of Government regulations and best practice on the arts sector. The Constitution was revised in 2016, the Governance plan in 2017, and the terms of reference for its various Committees are being updated in 2018 to fit new priorities and needs.

STRATEGIC PLAN 2017-2022

In 2017, Montsalvat Ltd adopted a new Strategic Plan, one that does not supplant, but rather incorporates and builds upon its 2007 Strategic Plan and its various revisions.

This is the 2017–2022 vision: 'Montsalvat will be recognised internationally as a respected Australian home of arts and culture, where work of the highest quality is created, taught, exhibited, performed, promoted and held in trust.'

And this the 2017-2022 mission: 'Montsalvat will continue to be a living, thriving artistic community, welcoming to the general public. We aim to educate and to promote local, national and international cultural

practice, and to conserve and enhance our magnificent natural site, unique buildings and collections so that present and future generations can draw inspiration from Montsalvat's serene beauty and creative heritage'.

MONTSALVAT'S ORGANISATIONAL STRUCTURE

Montsalvat's structure is simple and streamlined. Staff report to the General Manager, who reports to the Executive Director, who reports to the Board. Montsalvat Ltd's Committees report directly to the Board.

THE ARTS AT MONTSALVAT

Montsalvat's arts activities, its education, exhibition, concert, and festival programs are developed and directed by our Arts Manager, Jeannette Davison, assisted in 2017 by Petra Nicel and in 2018 by Gemma Eades. Ms Nicel and Ms Eades began their Montsalvat employment as our Barn Gallery reception and gift shop managers. Both then stepped up to their more concentrated arts roles, assisting Ms Davison. Montsalvat is proud to provide career path training for our staff, enabled in this case by Ms Davidson's generous mentoring.

CHAIR'S REPORT

In 2017-2018 there was further development of Montsalvat's new centre for ceramics, Clay Talk, in Hamish Knox's artfully extended building, known formerly as 'Hamish's Shed'. Pottery classes and residencies have been established, and plans developed for a relationship between Montsalvat and other institutions committed to ceramics education, all in time to catch the new wave of Australian enthusiasm for this most ancient of arts.

COMMUNITY, HOSPITALITY AND BUSINESS

Montsalvat welcomes the community into its buildings and grounds for a wide variety of community events, family celebrations, commemorations, photographic and film shoots, school excursions, and a variety of other services. Once here, people from far and near catch some of the magic of this home of the arts at the same time as they mark milestones in their lives. The income from our community and hospitality services underpins our expanding arts programs, and enables us to better preserve and enhance our heritage buildings and grounds.

I thank our stalwart events team, Elysia Shultz (2017) and Rebecca Jory and Graham Brew, for their energy and unflagging professionalism.





GROUNDS AND MAINTENANCE

Montsalvat's head gardener Jo Douglas has continued to inspire and collect around her a vigorous band of gardening and maintenance staff and volunteers. In all weathers and through whatever challenges Australia's shifting climate throws at them, they tend Montsalvat's natural and physical environment with care and a practical bent that is as sensitive as it is effective.

CONCLUSION

Montsalvat is one of Australia's treasures – a rare and unusual place, with a complex history that mirrors the many phases and changes that our society has undergone over the past eighty-plus years. I thank all, the artists, residents, my Board colleagues, management, staff and volunteers – the entire community – who have contributed to Montsalvat's continued thriving. It is the oldest surviving arts community in Australia. May it continue to provide peace, beauty and inspiration for generations to come.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

2017/2018 was another very positive year for Montsalvat with an extensive Arts program, improved studio facilities for artists, expanded heritage building maintenance activities, strong community program and the hosting of many functions as we welcome families and communities to Montsalvat to celebrate and signify their important occasions.

Montsalvat's mission is to continue to be a living, thriving, creative artistic community and Montsalvat's Arts program is underpinned by the many excellent artists who live, create, exhibit, perform and teach at Montsalvat. The highlights of this program include the Nillumbik Prize, the Milton Moon and Distinction ceramic exhibitions curated by Anna Maas from Skepsi Gallery, and the Montsalvat Arts Festival. A total of 40 exhibitions were presented across the Barn Gallery, Long Gallery, Residents Gallery and the Boulevard@ Montsalvat. In addition, 10 concerts were held, including performances by the world class Flinders Quartet. This outstanding program is a credit to our very hard working and talented Arts Manager Jeannette Davison and Arts Support Coordinators Petra Nicel and Gemma Eades.

The Montsalvat community has over 20 artists who make, create and teach art at Montsalvat. These include jewellers, painters, musical instrument makers, glass sculptors, ceramic artists, musicians and filmmakers. The artists gain inspiration from Montsalvat's unique and serene environment created by Justus Jörgensen, but they also need studios and facilities for their work and there have been important enhancements to the artistic spaces in the last year.

Clay Talk, our new ceramics studio and school, has opened and is now hosting studio ceramics artists and workshops in a building refurbished by Hamish Knox and Allen that provides practical spaces for the practice and creation of ceramic art in an environment in keeping with the Montsalvat spirit.

Nearly 50,000 people have visited Montsalvat during the year, to enjoy the exhibitions and performances or relax in the grounds. Montsalvat hosts two major festivals each year in our open day and our Arts Festival in October, both very popular with Eltham families and others from further afield. Montsalvat Functions supported 98 weddings and ceremonies, 38 funerals and 11 other events in the grounds of Montsalvat, allowing families to celebrate and signify important events in their lives. Over 100 film and photography activities, including a major film shoot, took place using the magnificent heritage buildings and grounds as a backdrop.

As Montsalvat secures its future with strong financial management. It is encouraging to report that Montsalvat made a surplus for the eleventh consecutive year, erasing the earlier debts that had burdened the organisation and putting Montsalvat on the much stronger financial footing that enabled investment in our planned improvements for artists and other stakeholders. Montsalvat is a not-for-profit company and any surplus is used to benefit Montsalvat directly, particularly through capital works and maintenance activities.

Montsalvat's achievements during the year could not have occurred without the contributions of many people. First I would like to thank Rob Hauser who retired as Executive Director this year after 9 years of service. His work has led to the many improvements highlighted in this report, in particular its financial stability. At the same time Montsalvat's character and artistic focus have been enhanced.

I thank all our Board members, who bring their skills on a pro-bono basis to Montsalvat, for their commitment to Montsalvat during the year. In particular I thank the Board Chair Morag Fraser who has been in the role since the formation of Montsalvat Ltd in 2006. Her outstanding leadership continues to inspire artists and staff.

MONTSALVAT ARTS FESTIVAL 10TH SEPTEMBER 2017 @ 10AM – 4PM

This year's Montsalvat Arts Festival program design was built around the idea of three dimensions. In keeping with this a number of new sculptures were installed in the grounds for the day of the festival. Sculptures by Aldo Bilotta found a home by the Painting School. These witty works suggested the life and struggles of the artist through various iterations of enormous metal 'tubes of paint'. Matt Hill delivered and installed his life size mother and baby elephant beside the Monet pond wherein our onsite artist Timothy Clarkson had installed his 'floating' ceramic ducks. We were also pleased to show off our new acquisitions of the marble works of Shona Nunan and Michael Cartwright sited on the meadow earlier this year. Once again, environmental artist Lloyd Godman suspended one of his bromeliad works titled Alpha Space Station 1 in the Barn Courtyard. A beautiful light-filled three-dimensional installation by Nillumbik Prize shortlisted artist Louise Meuwissen was tucked away in an unexpected place behind the Old Dining room.

Chris Wynne provided an exhibition of handmade guitars titled Music in Three Dimensions in the Great Hall and gave two presentations describing the history of Thomas Lloyd Guitars and the courses he runs.

Once again, children's workshops offered opportunities for young creatives to try their hand at arts and crafts at Montsalvat. Another Brick in the Wall utilised fabric covered house bricks. Children were invited to build a three-dimensional ephemeral work with the bricks. Nesting, as the name suggests, involved the making of a massive nest in the Pine Forest. Stick ya neck out offered adults and children an opportunity to design a wild looking textured collar. Our onsite textile expert, Jo Ludbrook facilitated this workshop. Susan Reddrop facilitated a hand casting workshop in her studio.

Clay Talk offered tempting wheel throwing demonstrations by Tania Jeffery, encouraging visitors to consider booking into upcoming workshops.

Once again, our exhibiting artists and our current Artist in Residence Florentina Munteanu generously made themselves available to talk about their work with visitors. Several sales of work resulted. The Affinity Trio began the day with a superb performance in the Barn Gallery. We followed that up with a previous artist in residence, composer Paul Mason, making great use of our Yamaha

piano in the Barn Gallery. The Scrims bluegrass band added fun in the glasshouse courtyard while Rodney Waterman and Ben Robertson gave us a performance titled Wind, Wire, Wood, (a nod to the three-dimensional theme) in the Upper Gallery. The Thando Sikwila Trio worked the crowd on the Meadow and La Rumba had the crowd on their feet and dancing in the Great Hall Courtyard. Mezzo soprano Juliet Dufour put a lively spin on opera by the Monet Pond.

Open Studios is always a popular aspect of our Arts Festival. The following studio artists opened their doors to the public on the day: Chris Wynne / Angela Abbott / Carol Moschetti / Kate Belvedere / Mariella McKinley / Susan Reddrop / Belinda Rogers / Simon Baigent / Sue Thomas

The organisation of the day is reliant on voluntary assistance. 36 volunteers generously gave us their time on the day with duties including workshop supervision, pond supervision, and front of house in the ticket office. Montsalvat would like to thank those people for their contribution. The day could not be managed without them. The official photographer for the day Natasha Hall worked voluntarily all day to take the photos and then many hours thereafter to edit them. We thank her for the many hours she committed to us. One of our exhibiting artists (Fragments Maria Colaidis The Boulevard @ Montsalvat) took some very evocative photos in the painting school which was also open on the day.

A thank you also to our Montsalvat staff. Their dedication and energy for this festival is palpable in the leadup and on the day. They consistently demonstrate their ability to work as a team throughout the preparation and carriage of this festival. The diligence of every one of them is an essential element to the success of the day.

Around 2,000 people were here on the day and their feedback was very favourable.

NILLUMBIK PRIZE 2018 31ST MAY – 22ND JULY 2018

Montsalvat was proud to administer and host the 2018 Nillumbik Prize for the Nillumbik Shire Council. This prize has become known for showcasing contemporary works of excellence by artists who are either residents of the shire or who have a connection to the shire. A total of 39 mixed media works were selected by a panel including Grace Longato, local artist Christine Johnson, and

MUD BRICK TOUR REGISTRATION AND CONCERT 22ND OCTOBER 2017

The Mud Brick Tours were run by Eltham High School as a fund raiser for their music program. Participants were welcomed into a selection of the many mud brick dwellings in the area. Montsalvat made our parking areas and the Barn Gallery available to the school for this event free of charge to support their music program. The performances of the music students in the Barn Gallery were outstanding.

CLAY TALK

On the 16th September 2017, after more than 3 years of planning, research and building, Clay Talk @ Montsalvat opened its doors to the public, offering classes for terms 3 and 4.

The initial 2 classes were a beginners vessel forming class, that was a combination of hand building and wheel throwing. These classes were facilitated by Tania Jeffery

under the watchful eye of Varuni Kanagasundaram and Denholm Lappas.

In Term 1, 2018 the classes were increased to four and the option of a 6 or 8 week term was offered. In Term 2, 2018 the hand building course was put on hold, and 3 wheel throwing courses were run with a total of 23 students. By the end of June, 10 classes were completed with a total of 64 enrolments.

Partnerships with institutional associations are being fostered to help Clay Talk achieve the next stage of its development; a local and international ceramics residency. Although in its infancy this is an exciting next chapter for Clay Talk with the partnerships and possibilities endless.

MADE AT MONTSALVAT SHOP

Our Made @ Montsalvat shop continued to offer an opportunity for our onsite artists and other artists from our community to sell small items. Sales within the shop steadily increased over the last financial year.

PUESTA DEL SOL

The audience for Puesta del Sol has grown over the last twelve months. There is a clear appetite for this type of activity at Montsalvat. We will look to developing this event further into the future.





THE CHORAL FESTIVAL

Our thanks to the indefatigable Faye Dumont who ably

heads up the management of this festival. Once again approximately 1000 people were on site for the day long festival. Approximately 16 choirs performed across our Barn Gallery, Upper Gallery and Long Gallery.


WORKSHOPS AND CLASSES

We are very committed to bringing children to Montsalvat for the purpose of making and creating artworks.

In January 2018 we offered a children's school holiday workshop with facilitator Wendy Jane Sheppard across two days. The workshop centred around rubbings and printmaking.

We have continued to offer workshops for the children involved in our Friends of Montsalvat program. These workshops are inspired by the exhibitions in the Barn Gallery. The children are introduced to the workshop via a walk around the exhibition. In this way there is an element of art appreciation in each workshop. For example, with the ceramic exhibition in partnership with Skepsi Gallery the children worked with clay and for Heather Davies' exhibition of photography, Transient Moments, the children worked with the principles of photography.

In addition, our annual arts festival offered a number of children's workshops with a three-dimensional outcome.


